10111 English for Communication

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To be able to use English as a means for communication.
- 2. To study structures, vocabulary and important English idioms.
- 3. To equip students with skills in listening, speaking, reading and writing in English for accuracy and appropriateness in various situations

Course Description

Structure, vocabulary and English idioms used in listening, speaking, reading and writing English for communication.

10121 Human Civilization

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To have knowledge on Eastern and Western divilization in terms of politics, economy, and society.
- 2. To understand human civilization in the past which is fundamental of the current civilization.
- 3. To realize and appreciate the values of human civilization.

Course Description

Knowledge on Eastern and Western civilization human has created in terms of politics, economy, society, wisdom, arts, as well as science and technology.

10131 Human Society

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To understand the existence of human community and society.
- 2. To understand the political, legal, economic and social mechanisms affecting the organization of human society.
- 3. To promote the responsibility to the society and the nation.

Course Description

Basic characteristics of being human; cohesion into communities and societies; human distribution and settlements; the components of society; human behavior in society; political, legal, economic and social mechanisms affecting the organization of human society; social problems and methods to solve them; promotion of a good society.

10141 Science, Technology and Environment for Life

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To gain knowledge about the concepts, rules and development of science and technology, and how they influence of thought and human livelihood.
- 2. To gain knowledge of ecology concerning human beings.
- 3. To understand the relationship between humans, the environment, and the effects of science and technology on the environment.
- 4. To gain knowledge of the applications of science and technology in daily life.
- 5. To enhance scientific thinking and awareness of the need for environmental preservation.

Concepts, theories, critical thinking, rules and development of science and technology; natural history concerning human beings; the parts of the human body; humans and the environment; hygiene and nutrition; the application of science, technology, and mathematics in everyday life.

10151 Thai Studies (6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To learn about Thailand's history, society, language and culture.
- 2. To be able to apply the course knowledge to daily life.
- 3. To understand and take pride in what it means to be Thai.

Course Description

Knowledge about Thai in terms of history, settlement, politics, economy, culture, religion and ritual, language and literature, arts and culture.

10162 Chinese for Communication

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To gain knowledge about Standard Chinese phonology, Mandarin phonetic alphabet (Hanyu Pinyin), and be able to write and pronounce the alphabet correctly.
- 2. To gain knowledge about Chinese characters--as basic words or assembled ones--and sentence structure and grammar for general communication, including practice with writing Chinese characters.
- 3. To be able to use Chinese in everyday life.

Course Description

Standard Chinese phonology, Hanyu Pinyin transcription, basic words, and dialogues for everyday use, structural grammar, and learn and practice writing of 550 Chinese characters.

10163 Khmer for Communication

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To possess knowledge on the phonology, letters, grammatical structure and basic sentence structure of Khmer,
- 2. To be able to use basic Khmer for communication in daily life.
- 3. To possess knowledge on Khmer words used in the Thai language.

Course Description

Khmer phonology; the practice of writing the Khmer alphabet; Crieng and Mul alphabets, basic Khmer words used in daily life; grammatical structure and basic sentence structure; listening, speaking, reading and writing skills for communication at the basic level; and Khmer words used in the Thai language.

41463 Principles of Judicial Administration, Human Rights, and

(6 credits)

Good Governance

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To understand principles of judicial administration.
- 2. To understand principles of human rights, morality, ethics and good governance.
- 3. To apply the knowledge in conduct of life.

Principles of judicial administration and laws in daily life consist of conception, principles, definitions of civil and criminal administration of judicial, historical development of international administration judicial, fundamental knowledge of general law, significant laws in conduct of life, regulations of social and country, rule of law, alternative justice and problems and obstacles in administration of judicial.

Human rights, morality, ethics, and good governance principle consist of human rights, roles and development of human rights in global and local levels, concept of human rights, state policies affecting human rights, moral conceptions, ethic and social responsibility of government officers, good governance conduct, moral problems in the age of globalization, social impacts, and also the development guidance of moral and ethic.

80102 Introduction to Political Science

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To encourage students to understand and be able to explain meanings, concepts and the evolution of political science, as well as political theories and international politics.
- 2. To guide students to understand and to be capable of explaining political institutions and processes, including political behaviours and phenomena.

Course Description

In order to achieve the aforementioned objectives, this course provides basic knowledge covering the content and evolution of political science, specifically the most basic concepts and definitions, such as state, sovereignty, political institutions and processes, political systems, political behaviour and phenomena. The basic knowledge provided by this course also covers political theories, concepts of civil rights and obligation, the relationship between state and it citizens, and international politics. Finally, this course also offers knowledge covering concepts and development in the history of ideas and practices in Thai political science.

80111 Introduction to Thai Politics and Government

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

To accquire knowledge of the development and essence of political and institutions, processes as well as problem of Thai politics and the government.

Course Description

This the course covers the development and essence of Thai politics and government, including Thai political institution and processes, major problems of Thai politics and government from the past to the present.

80212 Introduction to Public Administration and Policy

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

This course aims at guiding students to gain awareness and understanding of problems regarding regional politics and Thai minority groups and approaches to solving these problems.

Course Description

The course covers meanings and concepts of and approaches to the study of public administration and policy, essence, techniques and processes of public administration, good governance in organization, and also public administration in democratic processes and modern political society.

80410 Professional Experience in Political Science

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To draw on all knowledge in political science and related fields in order to assist analysis, explanation and forecasting political phenomena in a theoretically correct manner.
- 2. To have the ability to apply knowledge in political science and related fields efficiently in professions in both the public and private sectors.
- 3. To have knowledge and understanding of the significance of the political science profession and the roles of political scientists.
- 4. To have the ability to continually pursue self-development to be knowledgeable, capable, have the right character and social skills for society, leadership, morality and ethics.

Course Description

This course provides the application of all knowledge in political science using to analyze and explain political problems and phenomena both within Thai society and in foreign countries in a theoretically correct manner. Students will learn how to apply knowledge in political science and related fields efficiently in professions in both public and private sectors, evaluation of potential, environment and forecasts of future trends, as well as developing one's own social aptitude, skills, effective leadership, morality and ethics.

81314 An Introduction to Political Research

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To have knowledge and understanding of scientific philosophy along with the ability to pursue further knowledge in political science.
- 2. To be able to apply both qualitative and quantitative research methodologies in political science to Thai political science research.
- 3. To be able to identify problems and obstacles in Thai political science research.

Course Description

The course covers the scientific philosophy and philosophy of political science, methods of pursuing knowledge, scope of political science research, theoretical frameworks in political science research, as well as qualitative and quantitative research in political science. It also covers the procedural steps of political science research, problems, obstacles and the direction of Thai political science research.

81427 Criminal Law for Political Science

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

- To give students foundational knowledge about law in general, principles and theory of criminal law and the criminal code, provisions of criminal law, and all types of violations of criminal law including petty offences.
- 2. To give students the ability to apply their knowledge to judge problems, facts and provisions of the law correctly.

Course Description

In this course, students will learn about characteristics of criminal law, criminal liability theory, jurisdiction, attempted offences, principals and accomplices in an offence, multiple offences, recidivism, statute of limitations prescription, punishments in criminal law and provisions on petty offences, criminal offences relating to national security, offences against public administration, and offences against life, body, property and so on.

81428 Criminal Procedure and Evidence for Political Science

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To give students knowledge and understanding about criminal proceedings and the criminal procedure code regarding administrative officers, police, inquiry officials, public prosecutors and courts.
- 2. To give students knowledge and understanding about evidence in criminal cases.
- 3. To give students the ability to apply their knowledge to judge any problems, facts or laws that may arise.

Course Description

This course explores the criminal procedure code starting with the basic principles and structure of the Criminal Procedure Code I and general principles. Students then learn about the powers of administrative officers, police, public prosecutors and courts as well as criminal case investigation, criminal measures and acting in accordance with criminal measures. The mentioned measures include the power of the public prosecutor to order cases, the filing of criminal and civil cases in connection with a criminal offence, criminal procedure in the court of first instance, criminal procedure in the Appeals Court and Supreme Court including the enforcement of judgments, pardon, commutation and reduction of punishment, court fees, evidence in criminal cases including oral evidence, documentary evidence and material evidence, and experts.

82201 Introduction to International Relations

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

Offering knowledge regarding international politics included political-decision-making processes and factors affecting international relations in general is a foundation for this course. Causes of wars and conflicts are also studied as well as international practices and organizations with anticipation that solution could be found in order to at least lessen such conflicts. IR Theories are essential for this course.

Course Description

This introduction course covers international politics, various factors influencing international relations, e. g. national power and interests and balance of power. Policy-decision-making process and practices are affected by those factors. Causes of war and conflicts, roles of international laws and organizations are also studied, specifically after World War II period. Comprehending and having capability to apply IR theories are also accentuated.

82202 Comparative Politics

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

To acquire knowledge about concepts, theories and methods of comparative study on forms, structured processes, and political development in various regions of the world.

Course Description

The course covers the concepts, theories and methods of comparative study on forms, structured, processes and political development in various regions of the world.

82227 Political and Social Thoughts

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

This course offers knowledge regarding political and social thoughts derived from the East and the West. They are foundation for explaining political and social phenomena in order to provide political and social alternatives.

Course Description

Not only is comprehending foundational essence of social and political thoughts originated from the East and the West thinkers necessary for explaining social and political phenomena. It could also generate ideas and actions to cope with domestic and international problems.

82321 Governments and Politics in Asia

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

The objective of this course is to have knowledge and understanding about the background, structure, duties, process and policy of the political systems of countries in Asia.

Course Description

This course covers background, duty, structure, process, policy and political systems of various countries in Southeast Asia, East Asia, West Asia, and South Asia, as well as economic and social environments affecting political systems in Asia. All of these studies will consider existing cultural and political behavior in various political systems of Asian countries.

82322 World Society

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

This course aims at guiding students to have knowledge about current world structures and the background of current systems as a foundation for understanding the formation and development of political and economic systems currently in use as well as political behavior of superpower countries which impacts world politics and currents of globalization.

Course Description

This course explores the current world structure and the background of existing systems, presented by explaining the formation, expansion and disintegration of important civilizations of ancient times, the Middle Ages and modern times, economic, social and technological change in different eras. The aforementioned knowledge will be a foundation for understanding the formation and development of current political and economic systems as well as superpower behavior in both the past and present. Said otherwise, this course provides knowledge about foreign policy, strategy, economic tactics, politics and military matters of superpower countries and their impact on world politics. In this course, students will also learn about the development of currents in globalization which impact global society and Thai society and impact individuals' ways of life in many ways.

82324 International Economics and Politics

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

This course aims at guiding students to have knowledge about concepts and theories related to international economics, features of international economic cooperation, and international linkages between economics and politics by considering the ways in which politics and economics affect each other in international economic organizations.

In this course, students will learn about concepts and theories related to international economics, characteristics of cooperation, competition and conflict between nations in areas of commerce, finance, investment and assistance, and linkages between economic factors and international politics. These topics are addressed by considering interdependence, economic dependence and the formation of groups for regional economic integration around the world.

82325 International Conflicts and Cooperations

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

The objective of this course is to have knowledge about international relations behavior in the form of the international conflict and cooperation, origination, development and impact of conflicts and international cooperation.

Course Description

The course covers the behavior of international relations in terms of conflicts and international cooperation, origination, characteristics and the causes of this behavior as well as conflicts and international cooperation in various dimensions and levels and the impact of conflicts and international cooperation. It is also covers approaches to resolving conflict and encouraging international cooperation at both bilateral and multilateral levels.

82326 International Law and International Organization

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

This course aims at guiding students to have knowledge and understanding about the origin of international law and international organizations and how the role and function of these institutions has affected past and present international political events.

Course Description

This course covers the origins of international law, its philosophy and concepts, the relationship between internal law and international law, international law used in times of peace and war. This course also provides knowledge about origination, development, structure and authority, role, success and failure of international organizations such as the League of Nations, United Nations, World Trade Organization and other regional organizations, and the role of international law in international relations.

82327 Introduction to ASEAN

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

To offer knowledge on conceptual frameworks and rationales of regional cooperation and integration, and on the development and achievement of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations.

Course Description

A study of conceptual frameworks and rationales of regional cooperation and integration, and of the history of the establishment and achievement of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations.

82328 Public Policies in Global Contexts

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

To knowledge in concepts, theories, and approaches in public policies in the presents era on varieties dimensions to impact in international affairs.

Concepts, theories, and approaches in public policies in the presents era on various dimensions such as environment, economic, socio-culture, politics, and security that impact to the international affairs.

82329 Diplomacy and Foreign Policy

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

For understanding about past and present diplomacy and foreign policy.

Course Description

Development of diplomacy from the past to the present and foreign policy formulation and decision-making concepts and theories that affect international relations.

82425 Political Doctrines and Development Strategies

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

This course aims at guiding students to increase their knowledge and understanding about the relationship between political ideology and strategy and be able to analyze the influence of political ideology on the setting of strategies for development.

Course Description

This course covers the relationship between political ideology and national development strategies, the influence of political ideology on determining development strategies and patterns of development, views of developing societies towards analyzing and solving problems, case studies comparing development experiences of countries with different political ideologies, as well as the development of concepts in various groups.

82426 Governments and Politics in Europe and America

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

This course aims at guiding students to have knowledge and understanding of the background and political systems of various countries in Europe and America and be able to explain economic and social conditions which affect the political systems of those countries.

Course Description

In this course, students will learn about the background and political systems of various countries in Europe and America and their structure, function, processes and policy, as well as the impact of the economic and social environment on the political systems of Europe and America. All of these topics will involve consideration of the culture and political behavior existing in the political systems of various countries in Europe and America.

82427 Human Development in Global Contexts

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

To enlighten approaches, theories and methodologies of human development and quality of life in global contexts for human security.

Course Description

Approaches, theories and methodologies of human development and quality of Life; physical and spiritual dimensions, in global in contexts for human security.

82429 Thailand s Foreign Affairs

(6 credits)

To understanding in foreign policy and impact on Thailand.

Course Description
