10131 Human Society

33442 Strategic Management in Public Administration

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To acquire knowledge and understanding on concepts, theories, principles, model, process, and techniques of strategic management.
- 2. To acquire skills for analysis and model implementation for analyzing and formulating strategies in different levels.
- 3. To be able to apply knowledge in strategic management to practice of public organization administration. *Course Description*

Study and analysis of concepts, theories, principles, model, process, and techniques of strategic management in public organizations; analysis and formulation of strategies in different levels: national, organizational, for responsibilities and departments in public organization including mission, vision, philosophy, policy and objectives; strategic planning; operational planning; strategies implementation; systems and methods specification for strategic control; strategies assessment for effective and efficient operations under uncertainty and globalization.

33449 Public Service Administration and Networking (6 credits) Course Learning Outcomes (6 credits)

- 1. To acquire knowledge and understanding about concepts, principles and significance of public service and networking.
- 2. To acquire understanding about related factors and methods of public service and networking.
- 3. To acquire understanding about methods and techniques for public service management and networking, including and be able to apply them to practice.
- 4. To acquire understanding about problems, trends, solutions to problems and development of public service management and networking.

Course Description

Concepts and principles for public service management and networking; factors that have impact on public service and networking; administrative systematization and supporting information system for public service and networking structure systematization; service quality and improvement; communication, interpersonal relation, and morals in public service; service assessment; problems and solutions, trends and development guide of public service and networking.

41463 Principles of Judicial Administration, Human Rights, and Good Governance

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To understand principles of judicial administration.
- 2. To understand principles of human rights, morality, ethics and good governance.
- 3. To apply the knowledge in conduct of life.

Course Description

Principles of judicial administration and laws in daily life consist of conception, principles, definitions of civil and criminal administration of judicial, historical development of international administration judicial, fundamental knowledge of general law, significant laws in conduct of life, regulations of social and country, rule of law, alternative justice and problems and obstacles in administration of judicial.

(6 credits)

Human rights, morality, ethics, and good governance principle consist of human rights, roles and development of human rights in global and local levels, concept of human rights, state policies affecting human rights, moral conceptions, ethic and social responsibility of government officers, good governance conduct, moral problems in the age of globalization, social impacts, and also the development guidance of moral and ethic.

80102 Introduction to Political Science

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To encourage students to understand and be able to explain meanings, concepts and the evolution of political science, as well as political theories and international politics.
- 2. To guide students to understand and to be capable of explaining political institutions and processes, including political behaviours and phenomena.

Course Description

In order to achieve the aforementioned objectives, this course provides basic knowledge covering the content and evolution of political science, specifically the most basic concepts and definitions, such as state, sovereignty, political institutions and processes, political systems, political behaviour and phenomena. The basic knowledge provided by this course also covers political theories, concepts of civil rights and obligation, the relationship between state and it citizens, and international politics. Finally, this course also offers knowledge covering concepts and development in the history of ideas and practices in Thai political science.

80111 Introduction to Thai Politics and Government

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

To accquire knowledge of the development and essence of political and institutions, processes as well as problem of Thai politics and the government.

Course Description

This the course covers the development and essence of Thai politics and government, including Thai political institution and processes, major problems of Thai politics and government from the past to the present.

80202 Thai Political Institutions and Processes (6 credits) Course Learning Outcomes

The objective of this course is to guide students to understand Thai political processes affected by the political activities of various groups of people.

Course Description

This course offer students instruction about Thai political institutions and processes influentially entangled by the involvement of leaders and others in both official and unofficial capacities.

80204 Thai Political Economy

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

This course aims at helping students to understand fundamental concepts about the relationship between economics and politics so that they can analyse political power constructed and expanded by political and economic groups.

In order to achieve the above aim, this course provides fundamental concepts about the relationship between economics and politics. This course will therefore cover knowledge regarding the evolution of economic groups in Thailand, general characteristics and mechanisms of expansion and relations among different economic groups, economic power constructed by political groups and vice versa.

80205 Socio-cultural Basis of Thai Politics

Course Learning Outcomes

The main objective of this course is to guide students to understand the relationship and impact of socio-cultural changes upon political systems, processes and behaviours that occurred after world War II.

Course Description

This course offers basic understanding about relationship between socio-cultural changes and their impacts on political systems, processes and behaviours, especially those that have occurred after World War II.

80212 Introduction to Public Administration and Policy (6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

This course aims at guiding students to gain awareness and understanding of problems regarding regional politics and Thai minority groups and approaches to solving these problems.

Course Description

The course covers meanings and concepts of and approaches to the study of public administration and policy, essence, techniques and processes of public administration, good governance in organization, and also public administration in democratic processes and modern political society.

80410 Professional Experience in Political Science (6 credits) Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To draw on all knowledge in political science and related fields in order to assist analysis, explanation and forecasting political phenomena in a theoretically correct manner.
- 2. To have the ability to apply knowledge in political science and related fields efficiently in professions in both the public and private sectors.
- 3. To have knowledge and understanding of the significance of the political science profession and the roles of political scientists.
- 4. To have the ability to continually pursue self-development to be knowledgeable, capable, have the right character and social skills for society, leadership, morality and ethics.

Course Description

This course provides the application of all knowledge in political science using to analyze and explain political problems and phenomena both within Thai society and in foreign countries in a theoretically correct manner. Students will learn how to apply knowledge in political science and related fields efficiently in professions in both public and private sectors, evaluation of potential, environment and forecasts of future trends, as well as developing one's own social aptitude, skills, effective leadership, morality and ethics.

81310 Political Philosophy

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To understand ideas in Eastern and Western political philosophy.
- 2. To explain and analyze the problems occurred in various present-day political systems.

(6 credits)

Students will explore western concepts from ancient times to the present, especially the political philosophy of Plato and Aristotle in the classical period, in Roman and medieval period such as Thomas Aquinas, Machiavelli, Hobbes, Rousseau, Montesquieu, Bentham, Hegel, Berg and Marx. The course, in addition, will provided the essence and debate on key concepts such as sovereignty, social contract, society, liberalism and socialism, and also the eastern political philosophy. These philosophical concepts will be applied to analyze and evaluate the present political problems in various political system.

81311 Principles and Methods of Political Science Course Learning Outcomes

This course aims at guiding students to have knowledge and be able to explain about the evolution, scope, status and approaches to studies in political science, as well as significant analysis regarding states, political institutions, and so on.

Course Description

This course covers the evolution, scope, status and study guidelines of political science in antiquity, after World War II, in the era of behavioral science and later, focusing on content, study approach and significant analysis about states, political institutions, powers, political groups, public policy and political systems. Also covered are political economics principles including the evolution, scope, status and study approach as well as the influence of the economic system on political changes, relations between political science and other social sciences; the evolution, scope and status of political science in Thailand.

81314 An Introduction to Political Research (6 credits) Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To have knowledge and understanding of scientific philosophy along with the ability to pursue further knowledge in political science.
- 2. To be able to apply both qualitative and quantitative research methodologies in political science to Thai political science research.
- 3. To be able to identify problems and obstacles in Thai political science research.

Course Description

The course covers the scientific philosophy and philosophy of political science, methods of pursuing knowledge, scope of political science research, theoretical frameworks in political science research, as well as qualitative and quantitative research in political science. It also covers the procedural steps of political science research, problems, obstacles and the direction of Thai political science research.

81427 Criminal Law for Political Science

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To give students foundational knowledge about law in general, principles and theory of criminal law and the criminal code, provisions of criminal law, and all types of violations of criminal law including petty offences.
- 2. To give students the ability to apply their knowledge to judge problems, facts and provisions of the law correctly.

(6 credits)

In this course, students will learn about characteristics of criminal law, criminal liability theory, jurisdiction, attempted offences, principals and accomplices in an offence, multiple offences, recidivism, statute of limitations prescription, punishments in criminal law and provisions on petty offences, criminal offences relating to national security, offences against public administration, and offences against life, body, property and so on.

81428 Criminal Procedure and Evidence for Political Science (6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To give students knowledge and understanding about criminal proceedings and the criminal procedure code regarding administrative officers, police, inquiry officials, public prosecutors and courts.
- 2. To give students knowledge and understanding about evidence in criminal cases.
- 3. To give students the ability to apply their knowledge to judge any problems, facts or laws that may arise.

Course Description

This course explores the criminal procedure code starting with the basic principles and structure of the Criminal Procedure Code I and general principles. Students then learn about the powers of administrative officers, police, public prosecutors and courts as well as criminal case investigation, criminal measures and acting in accordance with criminal measures. The mentioned measures include the power of the public prosecutor to order cases, the filing of criminal and civil cases in connection with a criminal offence, criminal procedure in the court of first instance, criminal procedure in the Appeals Court and Supreme Court including the enforcement of judgments, pardon, commutation and reduction of punishment, court fees, evidence in criminal cases including oral evidence, documentary evidence and material evidence, and experts.

82201 Introduction to International Relations Course Learning Outcomes

(6 credits)

Offering knowledge regarding international politics included political-decision-making processes and factors affecting international relations in general is a foundation for this course. Causes of wars and conflicts are also studied as well as international practices and organizations with anticipation that solution could be found in order to at least lessen such conflicts. IR Theories are essential for this course.

Course Description

This introduction course covers international politics, various factors influencing international relations, e. g. national power and interests and balance of power. Policy-decision-making process and practices are affected by those factors. Causes of war and conflicts, roles of international laws and organizations are also studied, specifically after World War II period. Comprehending and having capability to apply IR theories are also accentuated.

82202 Comparative Politics

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

To acquire knowledge about concepts, theories and methods of comparative study on forms, structured processes, and political development in various regions of the world.

The course covers the concepts, theories and methods of comparative study on forms, structured, processes and political development in various regions of the world.

82321 Governments and Politics in Asia

Course Learning Outcomes

The objective of this course is to have knowledge and understanding about the background, structure, duties, process and policy of the political systems of countries in Asia.

Course Description

This course covers background, duty, structure, process, policy and political systems of various countries in Southeast Asia, East Asia, West Asia, and South Asia, as well as economic and social environments affecting political systems in Asia. All of these studies will consider existing cultural and political behavior in various political systems of Asian countries.

82327 Introduction to ASEAN

Course Learning Outcomes

To offer knowledge on conceptual frameworks and rationales of regional cooperation and integration, and on the development and achievement of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations.

Course Description

A study of conceptual frameworks and rationales of regional cooperation and integration, and of the history of the establishment and achievement of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations.

82426 Governments and Politics in Europe and America

Course Learning Outcomes

This course aims at guiding students to have knowledge and understanding of the background and political systems of various countries in Europe and America and be able to explain economic and social conditions which affect the political systems of those countries.

Course Description

In this course, students will learn about the background and political systems of various countries in Europe and America and their structure, function, processes and policy, as well as the impact of the economic and social environment on the political systems of Europe and America. All of these topics will involve consideration of the culture and political behavior existing in the political systems of various countries in Europe and America.

83201 Local Politics and Government Course Learning Outcomes

To acquire knowledge and understanding of the concepts, theories, and forms of local government in Thailand and foreign countries.

Course Description

The course covers the concepts of local politics and government, role of state, relation between local and national government, the development of Thai local politics, structural arrangement, modes of local government and trends of local politics and government in Thailand.

83202 Fundamental Laws for Political Science

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To acquire knowledge and understanding of Fundamental Laws
- 2. To acquire knowledge and understanding of legal criteria for political science practitioners.
- 3. To apply knowledge to decide legal problems for political science.

Course Description

The course covers meanings, several characteristics of laws, origins and development of laws, categories and principles of legal interpretation, law enforcement practices in the society, along with laws that are necessary for political scientists, such as civil and commercial law, labor law, Land law, social security law, intellectual property law, as well as legal mediation and conciliation.

83203 Democracy and Democratization

(6 credits)

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To acquire knowledge and understanding of concepts and theories about democracy and democratization.
- 2. To acquire knowledge and understanding of factors and forms of transition to democracy and consolidation of democracy.
- 3. To acquire knowledge and understanding of experiences of democratization in various countries.

Course Description

This course covers the concepts and theories of democracy, factors leading to democratic transition, such as economic, political, and social change, processes and modes democratic transition and process of democratic consolidation, as well as experiences of the democratization process in foreign countries.
